

Questions Tags



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You haven't got a car, <u>have you</u>? It was a good film, <u>wasn't it</u>?

Question tags are mini-questions put at the end of a sentence. The verb used in the question is repeated in the opposite form:

affirmative → negative negative → affirmative

You <u>are</u> hungry, <u>aren't</u> you? They <u>were</u> angry, <u>weren't they</u>? Tom <u>should</u> pass his exam, <u>shouldn't he</u>? Ann <u>will</u> be here soon, <u>won't she</u>?

→ present tense
→ past tense
→ modal
→ future (will)



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So, the verb is repeated in the opposite form.

TO BE / TO HAVE

MODAL VERBS: will/should/can etc.

For the **PRESENT and PAST SIMPLE** we use <u>do/does/did</u>:

For example:

She **is** smart, **isn't she**?

You **eat** pizza, **don't you**? → question in the pres. simple form

They **came** by car, <u>didn't they</u>? → question in the past. simp. form (to come → came)



Some examples

- 1) He <u>can't</u> drive, <u>can</u> he? → modal
- 2) Your sister <u>lives</u> in Spain, <u>doesn't</u> she? → present simple
- 3) You <u>haven't</u> seen this film, <u>have</u> you? → present perfect
- 4) She <u>is</u> a doctor, <u>isn't</u> she? → verb to be/pres. simple
- 5) Yesterday <u>was</u> so much fun, <u>wasn't</u> it→ to be/past simple
- 6) He <u>isn't</u> here, <u>is</u> he? → verb to be/pres. simple
- 7) The trains <u>are</u> never on time, <u>are</u> they? → verb to be/pr. s.
- 8) You parents **have** retired, **haven't** they? → present perf.
